Well, I didn't need the wood either but knew someone who did, so it was off to Pittsboro! Fellow chapter member John Dougherty had never been to the Piglet so I brought him along for company and to introduce him to the hub of so much chapter activity. We loaded up the wood and caught up on all the goings on there. I just love visiting there....if only it wasn't so dadbum far away from New Bern. It was getting to be about lunchtime, so we headed downtown for a great meal at Virlie's and then headed home and delivered the wood to the boys over at Bridgeton Boatworks.

The following week, I get a call from Jim Moores (JM), who tells me he is on the road headed back from Minnesota, where he had just purchased a "new" boat. I'm thinking "Minnesota? He must have really liked this boat a lot!" If any of you know Jim, he doesn't get very excited about "ordinary" stuff. He tells me he's dragging home a 1960-ish Cadillac aluminum boat with a 40HP Evinrude outboard. And, he said it had fins. He wasn't kidding about that part! It turns out that this particular boat is an aluminum/fiberglass composite; aluminum hull and fiberglass deck structure. The

boat had come from an estate sale so there was no information as to when it last was in use. JM was concerned about the outboard so I agreed to give it a look-see and figure out if it was viable option to use going forward.

Just before Jim had contacted me, another Jim was preparing a new boat for use. Jim Hartman's (JH) "Loon" was about ready to splash and I had agreed to assist him with the launch. Seeing as the boat had been kept indoors for a good period of time and had an original bottom, Jim had pre-soaked Loon for several days prior to the launch and she seemed like she would swell up just fine. Jim had arranged with the marina in River Bend to leave the boat in for a couple of days so he could monitor it closely. All went well and, in the end, hull leakage was very slight and a couple of mechanical issues were discovered and appeared to be easy fixes.

Right after that, it was off to Beaufort with JH in tow, to see the Cadillac. When we arrived, it was parked on the apron of JM's shop, a red, white and silver craft with tail fins so big that they obscured the outboard motor. Really! That sent me right back to the year of the big fins on American cars; 1959. After a cursory look-over, we entered the shop to see if JM was around and were met by Oleg and Anna, the couple who are in the process of taking over JM's business. They were busy working on the launch, aptly named "Patience" that JM designed and built, which is nearing sea trial status after 5 years. Very unusual design with beautiful workmanship. He's such a talented artist.



# **New ACBS Resto-Mod Class Judging Criteria**

## Judging guidelines:

Judging the Resto-Mod class is **subjective** and should be done in teams consisting of a minimum of 2 or 3 judges. A judge should have had experience in boat restorations, boat maintenance and/or ownership of vintage boats 25 years and older. A "celebrity judge" can be on the judging team.

Special consideration to judging this class should be given to: Fit and Finish, Function, Quality, Craftsmanship and Creativity. The vessel has to come to dock under its own power for judging. Scoring is done in no less than ½ point deductions.

## Examples of (not limited to) judging points:

Fit and Finish: Is the windshield well fitted to the hardware and curvature of the deck? Is the deck hardware and accessories nicely laid out? What is the quality of the finish and/or refinish work? Is the hardware plated or finished properly? Proper marine finishes? Overall appearance of the finish or brightwork.

**Function**: If the steering wheel has a throttle lever and horn button, is the lever and horn operational? Are all gauges and switches operational?

Quality: Is the engine properly detailed? Is the wiring neat and properly done? What is the quality of the components used in the modification? Custom made or modern off-the-shelf hardware?

**Craftsmanship:** Is there 3M5200 squeeze out? Are there runs in the epoxy, varnish, or paint? Wood selection? Upholstery?

**Creativity:** Model or type of vessel used for the restoration and modification. Choice of engine or propulsion system. Uniqueness of the modifications. Design and layout. Choice of colors and

# United States Coast Guard—Happy 233rd Birthday on August 4th!

The USCG was established in 1790 by Secretary of the Treasury Alexander Hamilton as the Revenue Marine Service. It later became the Revenue Cutter Service and, in 1915, was combined with the U.S. Lifesaving Service (formed 1878) to become the Coast Guard.

The Coast Guard is one of the oldest organizations of the federal government and, until the Navy Department was established in 1798, we served as the nation's only armed force afloat. We continued to protect the nation throughout our long history and have served proudly in our nation's conflicts. Our national defense responsibilities remain one of our most important functions even today. In times of peace we operate as part of the Department of Homeland Security, serving as the nation's front-line agency for enforcing our laws at sea, protecting the marine environment and our vast coastline and ports, and saving life. In times of war, or at the direction of the President, we serve under the Navy Department.

In 1967, the Coast Guard moved from the U.S. Department of the Treasury to the newly formed U.S. Department of Transportation. Following the enactment of the Homeland Security Act of 2002, the Coast Guard was transferred from Department of Transportation to the Department of Homeland Security on March 1, 2003.

# **Grand Craft: Classic Luxury meets Modernity**


I know ACBS is focused on preserving antique and classic boats, but there are some boats being produced right now that have the potential to be the next generation of beautiful boats that will need preserving.



#### What are the ACBS Definitions of Antique or Classic Boat?

**Historic:** A boat built up to and including 1918

Antique: A boat built between 1919 and 1942, inclusive Classic: A boat built between 1943 and 1975, (any material) Late Classic: A boat built 1976 to 25 years prior to the current year. **Contemporary:** Any wooden boat built within the last 25 years.

Boats classified as Historic up through Late Classic will be judged separately as Pre-

served or Restored boats.

Resto-Mod: Any historic, antique, classic or late classic boat that has been restored and modified with non-original parts and technology.
