Seasons greetings fellow boat enthusiasts!



Duplin Winery Pop-Up Event

Wednesday November 29th was a cold, blustery day—actually the perfect day to visit Duplin Winery in Rose Hill. Alan and Judy Hills arrived at 11 AM and tour guide Dave (AKA Santa), took us on a tour of the production area. There was not a whole lot going on except for wine aging and settling in very large, shiny, metal tanks but we did learn a lot about the difficulties the Fussell brothers had in the early years trying to get the business going. Now they process 5,000 tons of grapes each season and have two other locations, one in Myrtle Beach, SC and another in Panama City, FL

The tour cost \$11 each and includes one bottle of wine to take home (choice of two being processed at the facility at the time of the tour). Then we did the \$15 each wine tasting. It includes a small pour of 12 different wines, a taste of their Muscadine pineapple habanero salsa mixed with cream cheese and served on their home-made crackers—very tasty! We also tasted a wine slushy and some really great mulled wine. A glass of our choice of wine was included with the tasting which we had with our delicious lunch at their Bistro.

Of course we could not pass up the gift shop. We left with some holiday wine, salsa, and mulled wine seasoning.

For those who could not make the outing, we highly recommend a trip to Duplin Winery during the holidays. It was fun way to spend the day.

Christmas at Sea

(Editors note: I was looking for something nautical that had a Christmas theme when I found this.)

Robert Louis Stevenson wrote a poem called "Christmas at Sea." In June 1888, Stevenson set out for the Pacific Islands of the South Sea, an excursion that would only end six years later with his death. The descriptions of nautical life that appear in "Christmas at Sea" were drawn from some of his own experience as he made the journey. <u>Click here</u> to read the poem.

That research led me to a YouTube video of Sting's arrangement of a song based on this poem. He wrote the music in collaboration with harpist Mary Macmaster who leads the chorus in Gaelic. The song tells the story of a sailor battling the elements aboard a ship in sight of the town where he was born—close



enough to see snow on the roofs and smoke from the chimneys, even the smell of the meals as they prepared for Christmas.

What are the ACBS Definitions of Antique or Classic Boat?

Historic: A boat built up to and including 1918

Antique: A boat built between 1919 and 1942, inclusive Classic: A boat built between 1943 and 1975, (any material) Late Classic: A boat built 1976 to 25 years prior to the current year. **Contemporary:** Any wooden boat built within the last 25 years.

Boats classified as Historic up through Late Classic will be judged separately as Pre-

served or Restored boats.

Resto-Mod: Any historic, antique, classic or late classic boat that has been restored and modified with non-original parts and technology.
