

ACBS Announces Changes to 2022 Dues

Don't know if you read the ABCS Weekly Web Watch, but if you did, did you click on the "A Note from the President" to read the story? If not, you probably missed the big news. Ron Lyons announced that there will be a \$10 increase in National dues (from \$55 to \$65). This is to cover increasing cost and declining membership. We have lost 1,000 members since 2018—a significant drop in a short period of

time—probably due to a number of factors.

"However, we want to give all members the chance to renew at the current rate of \$55, so we are delaying the dues increase until February 1st. Please take this opportunity to renew your membership over the next month," said Lyons.

What are the ACBS Definitions of Antique or Classic Boat?

Historic: A boat built up to and including 1918

Aptique: A boat built between 1919 and 1943 is

Antique: A boat built between 1919 and 1942, inclusive

Classic: A boat built between 1943 and 1975, (any material)

Late Classic: A boat built 1976 to 25 years prior to the current year.

Contemporary: Any wooden boat built within the last 25 years.

Boats classified as Historic up through Late Classic will be judged separately as Pre-
