Tenney backs bill to deny bail to violent felons who reoffend

Congresswoman Claudia L. Tenney is backing a bill that would force states to amend their bail and pretrial detention rules to deny release for anyone previously convicted of a violent felony.

On Tuesday, Tenney introduced the House version of a bill written by Senator Tom Cotton, R-Ar. called the "No Bail Post-Jail Act." The relatively short bill would change the U.S. Criminal Code and require that all

American courts, state or federal, deny bail to anyone previously charged with a violent felony if they've been arrested for a new felony offense.

It would also define violent felonies as murder, aggravated assault, robbery and sexual assault. Anyone

who has served 30 days in state or federal prison for a conviction would be denied bail if brought in on new charges.

'New Yorkers and families across this country are sick of watching dangerous criminals cycle in and out

of our justice system," Tenney said. "If you've already been convicted of a violent felony and you commit yet another felony offense, you should not be allowed back onto our streets

Antique and Classic Boat Society show, being held in Clayton this week.


"We brought American Airlines up here," Nalle said.



State GOP preps for 2026 elections

Stefanik at center of efforts to flip New York to red

ALBANY — Congresswoman Elise M. Stefanik is critical to the state Re-

publican Party's goals this

year and next; she's working to fundraise for candidates this year, is helping to coordinate state



level party officials with the Trump administration and is likely to lead the party's ticket as their nominee for governor next year.

As the state Republicans held their bi-annual organizational meeting in an airport hotel on the outskirts of Albany Wednesday, Stefanik, R-Schuylerville, came

up again and again. Officials lauded her recent donation of \$500,000 to GOP candidates or party committees in all 62 counties of the state, and her ongoing work to keep people on the ground up to date with Trump administration efforts and national Republican priorities. And state GOP Chair Ed R.F. Cox, elected to another two-year term at the helm of the state committee, said Stefanik is 'absolutely' running to be the next governor of New York.

The Congresswoman hasn't formally announced a campaign. She has said she would wait to announce her decision after election day this year. On Wednesday, Cox said that was a strategy recommended by

ALBANY — Republicans have their nominee for the special election to replace former Assemblyman D. Billy

Jones, who retired late last month. On Wednesday, the NYGOP voted to select Brent Davison as their candidate.

At the party's annual reorganizational meeting in a ho-

tel on the outskirts of Albany, the chairs of Clinton, Essex and Franklin counties unanimously voted to nominate Davison for the upcoming special

Speaking with reporters after his nomination, Davison said he's hitting the ground running for the short special election timeline he's facing against his Democratic op-

ponent, Plattsburgh Town Supervisor Michael Cashman. "We've been working behind the scenes, I've been
