

Discussion: How to Sustain Our Boats in Perpetuity?

Judy Hills posted this on the Woody Boater forum on March 13th. The topic of the day was: "Is the Classic Boat Community Shrinking?"

Our ACBS Chapter was recently discussing the issue of how future old boat enthusiasts are going to be able to keep their boats running. As these boats age if one wants more than a museum piece to drag from show to show, one is going to be hard pressed to find parts to fix them. Locating someone knowledgeable to fix systems on old boats is going to be near impossible. Our chapter helps fund a scholarship to the boat building and marine systems program at a community college. We are having difficulty finding applicants. Who'll want to trouble shoot and work on an old engine that you can't find the parts to fix it with even if you were able to diagnose the issue? The newer systems are easier to diagnose and mostly fixed with plug and play electronics. Because students for the boat building program are getting fewer and fewer, the community college may be forced to close the program.

We have one member who is a very competent boat mechanic who is aging out and he can't even find someone to take over his business. We are aware of another who sold his business but had to take it back over. Even if someone has the mechanical skills, they may not have the business acumen to survive. This is a serious conundrum.

Young people are also not learning skills needed to maintain and repair these old boats. They hardly even wash their own vehicles.

There are many more costs and issues associated with owning an old boat besides the hull, acces-

sories, and the systems. You have to be able to store it. Many young people live in apartment complexes or gated/restricted communities which means they have to store the boat offsite. It also means that even if they were capable of doing maintenance and repairs—they would need a place to do it. If one lives in the northern climes—one has to deal with winterization and de-winterization. Even launching can be an issue in some places.

Personally we have seven children and five adult grandchildren who love to ride in our old boats, but who don't want anything to do with owning or maintaining them. This begs the question, will organizations like ACBS still be viable in 25 or 50 years?

Bottom line: the future will be exceedingly challenging for those who desire to see these wonderful pieces of history kept in Bristol fashion.





Our two dogs loved cruising in the Lyman - unfortunately we lost both of them this past year, but a puppy is likely in 2026.







What are the ACBS Definitions of Antique or Classic Boat?

Historic: Any boat built up to and including 1918 **Antique:** Any boat built between 1919 and 1942 **Classic:** Any boat built between 1943 and 1975

Late Classic: Any boat built 1976 to 25 years prior to the current year. **Contemporary:** Any wooden boat built within the last 25 years.

Boats classified as Historic up through Late Classic will be judged separately as Pre-

served, Restored or Resto-Mod

Resto-Mod: Any historic, antique, classic or late classic boat that has been restored and modified with non-original parts and technology.
