## **Chapter License Tags & Ball Caps Now Available**



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#### Blue Tango Gets Dunked—Again by Bill Conley

Blue Tango is a 1952 17-foot Chris-craft Special Runabout that belongs to Bill & Sharon Conley. For the past 7 years, Bill has worked very hard restoring the boat and the engine. Blue Tango was first launched on Falls Lake in early 2016, and used for the next year, but the engine never ran very well and there was always a small hull leak. In 2017, Bill and John Justice tried to tweak the engine running issue, but the engine blew (cracked a cylinder wall). 1½ year later, 2019, the boat engine was rebuilt, and Bill had put a new bottom on the boat. At the second splash-in by Bill and John at Lake Jordan on June 3rd, the engine started fine, but the hull leak was much worse. They did not dare go out on the lake to fine tune the engine under load. Bill continued to work on the leak problem, thinking it was a poorly sealed exhaust exit at the transom. On June 20, after fixing the exhaust issue, Bill, Sharon, and Garfield Karpiak put her in Falls Lake. Unfortunately, the leak was still bad. Bill found a bad crack in an original bottom side planks near the transom. He is working on fixing that, but as a result, Blue Tango was not ready for the Poker Run. Bill and Sharon brought her to be on display at the Blackbeard Sailing Club but rode along with Jim Hartman for the run. Bill hopes that this is the only leak left to fix so he can get the engine fine tuning done and begin enjoying the boat soon.

Alan had asked Bill to bring Blue Tango, even though at the last minute Bill had discovered that the hull was still leaking after numerous hours chasing and "fixing" the cause. They had to ride al the way back to get them, so the boats had to pick up additional cards at the second stop—Eastern Carolina Yacht Club. Here we were assisted by Chuck Dail who hosted us when we used the Club for our boat show dinner. Then off to Leif Eriksson's dock on the Trent River, the Galley Store Marina where we had our boat show and the last stop at the Bridgeton Harbor Marina where we were to have had our boat show before Hurricane Florence did a number on New Bern. Then the long run back to Blackbeard's Sailing Club.

At BSC we pulled the boats from the water and got them

squared away. We awarded the pennant prize to the Conley's—the only ones who took the time to do it. As you can see from the photo, it was apropos to the boat! They won a tote bag with gourmet Hunter trail mix and a license tag with the chapter's new logo. The best dressed crew award went to Dave and Deb Mahoney (loved Dave's racy hat). 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#### Model Builder Meets Real Deal by Alan Hills

Dick has been a model boat builder for a very long time and has created a number of works of art. He is now getting to the point where his hands are not steady enough to do the model work, but he wanted to build one last model-for me. So, I picked out a Chris Craft Special Runabout and together we constructed it. Dick mostly gave instruction and I did the cutting and gluing. Together we got it done and I built a display case for it. We

named it JULI for our wives (Judy/Libby). It sits proudly in my living room. It is something I'll always treasure as I do my friendship with Dick.

The model we built was a replica of the same boat owned by the Conley's. After the poker run, Bill had left the boat at Blackbeard Sailing Club. - Dave Mahoney brought an engine for Alan to give to Robert Blanchard.


And a chance to meet some new people:

#### What are the ACBS Definitions of Antique or Classic Boat?

Historic: A boat built up to and including 1918

**Antique:** A boat built between 1919 and 1941 inclusive **Classic:** A boat built between 1943 and 1975 (any material)

**Late Classic:** A boat built 1977 to 25 years prior to the current year. This classification is not eligible for "best of show" awards and is neither restored or preserved **Production Contemporary:** A production wooden boat built 1969 to present **Custom Contemporary:** A modified or one-of-a-kind wooden boat built 1969 to pre-

sent

**Replica:** A boat built in a non-production manner, intended to be a one-of-a-kind and usually an exact copy or duplicate o0f a boat previously built or manufactured.
