### Boat Poker Run in New Bern (Neuse & Trent Rivers) on June 7th

It has been several years (2019) since our last poker run, but those who participated will tell you how much fun it was. We have chosen New Bern because it is the confluence of two rivers, the Neuse and the Trent which provides numerous safe locations where we can distribute envelopes with poker cards in them. The run will end at a waterside restaurant where we will eat lunch and open the envelopes. There might be some other opportunities for fun there as well.

Here is the plan:

10:30 Launch at Lawson Creek Park ramp 1309 Country Club Rd.—get first card

1st stop: Bridgeton Harbor Marina (by RR bridge on Neuse River)

2nd stop: Galley Stores Dock (by Persimmons Restaurant on the water on Neuse River)

3rd stop: Member Leif Eriksson's Dock (on Trent River)

4th stop: Eastern Carolina Yacht Club (on Trent River)

Enter the Plantation canal at marker #3 and tie up at the restaurant by the River Bend marina. Lunch on your nickel at the Salt Water Grill. Return to Lawson Creek Park for retrieval.


The issue of what a widow should do with the boat when the spouse dies has come

## Cleanup of Tar-Pamlico River on May 17th

National River Cleanup Day was May 17th. The North Carolina Coastal & Piedmont Chapter organized a cleanup of the Tar-Pamlico River in the Washington, NC area. Our project partners included: the Royal Rangers Outpost 91(an adventure-based, merit-driven, faithbased, church ministry and mentoring program for boys), the NC Estuarium (a stateowned environmental, educational facility), Sound Rivers (Riverkeeper), River Vibes (a kayak rental company) and the City of Washington's Public Works Department.

Our chapter was represented by Eileen Lettick (food & publicity), Larry Lettick (boat), and Alan Hills (boat). Also supporting the event were chapter members Cindy Jordan, Jim Alexander, and John Dougherty. Organizer Judy Hills and chapter volunteer Bill Conley were too ill to attend. Volunteer Sharon Conley was also unable to attend.

In addition to our chapter, collaborators included: Katie McCullough (Executive Curator of the NC Estuarium), Katey Zimmerman (Tar-Pamlico Riverkeeper), Lee Godwin (leader of Royal Rangers), and Jennifer Schmitt (River Vibes).

#### Specific assistance included:

- · Our chapter—supplied boats, trash grabbers, trash bags, water & energy bars for participants, and lunch for organizers, the participants, and their families.
- The NC Estuarium—created and help disseminate a poster for the event, helped with publicity, set up Google Drive for photos, and provided chairs for the lunch.
- · Sound Rivers—set up the online signup for participants, helped with publicity, and monitored the weather & river conditions.

- · The Royal Rangers—provided youth participants and a boat;
- · River Vibes—loaned kayaks and PFDs to participants needing them, helped publicize the event, and allowed us the use of their golf cart for hauling lunch supplies.,
- The City of Washington's Public Works Department—picked up the trash we collected and hauled it to the dump.

The group communicated via Zoom and emails to organize the event. Judy created a list of safety instructions for participants and for the boat captains

On the day of the event, it was predicted to rain heavily, but it never did. Thirty youth and adult kayakers participated, along with twelve helpers/facilitators. The youth and adults cleaned the area around the Washington waterfront and across the river at Castle Island. According to Royal Ranger leader Lee Godwin,

"The kids had a lot of fun and want to do this again next year." Our Chapter also heard this from several other kayakers.

The participants removed an estimated 25 bags of trash, including large items such as lawn loungers, crab traps, and tires.

Eileen Lettick organized the picnic lunch with the assistance of Cindy Jordan. It was held in the Festival Park Gazebo at the downtown Washington waterfront near the kayak launch ramp. The NC Coastal & Piedmont Chapter served a free lunch to participants and their families.

Our organization purchased 12 trash grabbers for the event and donated them to the NC Estuarium after the event to use as needed. We donated leftover chips and swag bags to

the Boys & Girls Club of Washington.

The event was featured in the Washington Daily News on page one of the paper on Thursday, May 15, 2025, and the reporter promised a follow-up article with pictures postevent.

This project was a little more complicated to execute because of the number of project partners. Since we had not worked with them before, we did not know if they would

follow through as promised. But they all did! This was a very successful event, and we are truly grateful to our collaborators for helping us to achieve our objective of cleaning up a portion of the Tar-Pamlico River on National River Cleanup Day. The event exceeded our expectations.

The chapter is very pleased at this first effort to participate in National River Cleanup Day, and we hope to do it again next year. We submitted this article and photos to the ACBS WWW. Here are some photos from the event.






### Chesapeake Bay Boat Show June 13-15


### T-Ville Vintage Power Show June 12-14


### Marina Day & International Vintage Boating Day 8/16/25

#### Chris Craft Cabin Cruiser For Sale





### Al Use by ACBS Chapters

**Editor's note:** This item appeared in the ACBS Weekly Leadership Update this past month.

Get ready for a whole new wave of uses for Al in the antique & classic boating world! Hold onto your ball caps! We researched many sites that listed Al for use with boats and the marine industry. Few had any relevance to our type of boats, but there were some.

Today we want to feature MyGarage.Al <a href="https://www.mygarage.ai/">https://www.mygarage.ai/</a> Clicking on this link will take you to AutoFrame. The site homepage says, "Your car has a story - make sure it's never forgotten. Create a profile for your vehicle, upload photos, share its history, and connect with others who appreciate it's beauty." While the name implies the site is for cars, if you scroll down on the main page, you will see that you can choose the "boat" option which allows you to enter boat details and photo.

We signed into the site using Google and selected Gallery and filtered asset type "boat." Lo and behold, pictures and short descriptions of boats came up. The filter frame allows you to search by make/model and year of production. You can further refine the search by sorting on most recent, most liked, or by year. You can also select the option to see only ones for sale. If you click on one of the pictures, you'll be taken to the detail page for that boat. Each boat has a unique URL. For your boat show, instead of all the visual displays giving her history and restoration, you can just create a QR code for the unique URL, post it on the boat show placard, and with the click of a photograph on a phone, the boat show attendee is taken to this site that has all those details.

Chapter President Alan Hills entered his boat info on the site, and here are his comments on the experience followed by the link so you can check out how it looks. "It was easy to upload the photo. I just added a few pertinent details about the boat and the Al inserted the puffery (as I call it) to the basic information. I let the

Al create the detailed story, but had I wanted to take the time, I could have modified it as well as adding the features, specification data, milestones, and data repository. All-in-all, alt-hough I am not personally a fan of sites like these, it was simple to use." Click here to see the CC Cavalier information.

We encourage all our members to enter their boat information on this site before our fall chapter boat show. We want to create a laminated QR code placard that you can use anywhere, anytime. We will add the QR codes for the ACBS Join URL and our chapter's URL to the placard.

Remember that another benefit of posting your boat's information on this site is that when you are ready to sell that boat, the details are already available. Just think, instead of a detailed ad with pictures, all you have to do is to post the URL.

#### What are the ACBS Definitions of Antique or Classic Boat?

**Historic:** Any boat built up to and including 1918 **Antique:** Any boat built between 1919 and 1942 **Classic:** Any boat built between 1943 and 1975

**Late Classic:** Any boat built 1976 to 25 years prior to the current year. **Contemporary:** Any wooden boat built within the last 25 years.

Boats classified as Historic up through Late Classic will be judged separately as Pre-

served, Restored or Resto-Mod

**Resto-Mod:** Any historic, antique, classic or late classic boat that has been restored and modified with non-original parts and technology.
