It's great fun for the whole family and many of our members make it a regular part of their annual calendar. Indeed, we've also hooked quite a few from the event, as well!

In addition to the show, our chapter is also invited to a tour of the Jarrett Bay Marine Park and a pre-show party at Jim Moores' establishment on Friday, the day before the show itself. The Marine Park sits on 175 acres right next to the Intracoastal Waterway and hosts over 20 marine businesses. It is a premier marine ser-


### Oriental Boat Show—Never Know Who'll You'll Meet

# What I'm Watching: Sam Holmes Sailing by Jeff Martinson

About two years ago, during the early doldrums of the pandemic lockdown, I came across the YouTube channel, Sam Holmes Sailing. Specifically, a video called "Sailing Solo Across the Pacific in a 23 Foot Boat". I shared it with my family, and they were equally beguiled. Ever since, wathcing the exploits of Sam in his various endeavors has become must-see-TV for our household.

I'm not much into celebrities or influencers of the kind who make millions off YouTube, and although Sam does make enough to continue his adventures, he's far from making the pages of the DuPont Report. At 30 years old, though, he's done enough to maybe qualify for an article in Outdoor Living. In addition to his Hawaii voyage, he also sailed the US east coast from Maine to Key West, across the Atlantic, around and through the British Isles and along Norway and Sweden. Most recently, he sailed from Miami to the Bahamas then around the islands and back, all on a 16 foot Hobie Cat that cost him \$350. In his spare time, he snorkels, plays saxophone and paraglides.

To say that Sam is a risk taker with lots to boast about is perhaps an understatement.

But there's something about his aweshucks-naiveté that is disarming. He admits his mistakes. He takes the viewer along with him as he problem solves things that he has (initially) only a superficial knowledge of. And so we get to learn and experience the ups and downs along with him.

In short, Sam reminds me a great deal of our members. He's curious, gutsy, modest and willing to try new things for the sake of the adventure! The last thing I'll write about Sam Holmes is that he's a local - well, at least, he has been a local. I'm not sure if he still owns it, but he bought an old mechanic's garage on Idalia Road in Aurora about two years ago because it cost about the same to buy it and work on his boat there as it was to pay yard fees in Oriental. And as a bonus, now he's got some equity. (Smart kid!) He ended up using the office as an apartment, the garage as a workshop and kept the boat out front. ## **Getting that Smooth and Level Painted Finish**

An article contributed by Kevin Leiner from Small Boats Magazine and written by Peter Marshall. Here is the crux of "how-to:": "Staging surrounded the boat, laid out so we could walk continuously down the length of each side without stopping or tripping. In a shady spot, we had laid out our paint, thinners, rags, extra brushes and rollers, and anything we might need in a hurry. The plan was for an early start. We wanted to dry off the dew, get the hull wiped down, and be painting as soon as possible so as to take advantage of the cool morning air. Three of us mixed up our paint, grabbed our tools of choice, and went for it—one person rolling, another "tipping" the rolled-on paint with a brush, and the third stand-

ing by to pour more paint when we ran out and look for holidays, runs, and sags. And, most important, this third person also adjusted the viscosity of the paint as we went along; we would call out to have brushing thinner added as the sun evaporated it out of the paint pot, or to further thin the paint as the day heated up, to assure that the paint would flow out and level off. ### Arriving at the Show!

- The show is held at the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum and the site address is 213 North Talbot Street, St. Michaels, Maryland 21663.
- We encourage you to arrive on **Thursday** evening or Friday morning.
- We advertise and sell tickets for our show

based on three days; all day Friday, Saturday and until 3:00 PM on Sunday. We will not let anyone depart prior to 3:00 PM on Sunday!

- Vehicle parking is available at the Museum and throughout St. Michaels. No trailer parking in the Museum parking lot due to space constraints.
- "Land Display" Use Mill Street (coming from Easton it's a right turn from Talbot Street) to access the Museum grounds. An attendant will meet you at the gate and direct you to your land display location. You may then check in at the Registration Tent. Do not use the Crab Claw parking lot. You will be required to remain in that spot until the show ends on Sunday.

### "Water Display"

- If you choose to launch your boat prior to checking in at registration, turn onto E. Chew Avenue (coming from Easton it's a right turn from Talbot Street), go two blocks and turn left onto Harbor Avenue. The boat ramp will be on your left. Trailer parking is located at St. Michaels High School located at the corner of Meadow Street and Seymour Avenue (three blocks east of the launch ramp).
- If you choose to check in prior to launching your boat, please use the main entrance to the Museum parking lot and come to the Registration Tent. Do not use the Crab Claw parking lot.

"Boats to Sell" If you are bringing a BOAT TO SELL, use the main entrance to the Museum parking lot, drive through the parking lot and turn left at the drive entrance to the Field of Dreams.

### What are the ACBS Definitions of Antique or Classic Boat?

**Historic:** A boat built up to and including 1918

Antique: A boat built between 1919 and 1942, inclusive

Classic: A boat built between 1943 and 1975, (any material)

Late Classic: A boat built 1976 to 25 years prior to the current year.

Contemporary: Any wooden boat built within the last 25 years.

Boats classified as Historic up through Late Classic will be judged separately as Pre-

served or Restored boats. For more information click here.
