

Minutes of the 26 April 2023 Chapter Board Meeting

The Chapter Board held a business meeting on April 26, 2023. Here are the key points from that meeting. The full set of minutes are available on our website.

- Thursday May 18th has been set as a make-up date for the Trent River Run and Lunch at the Saltwater Grill.
- Going forward, we will plan an alternative to scheduled chapter events should the weather not cooperate.
- Dan Bixler has volunteered to help design graphics for a chapter t-shirt and chapter cups & water bottles. He also agreed to design the 2023 Chapter Boat Show poster.

- Our website was down for a few days in late April due to an ACBS server issue.
- One change to the planned chapter events for the balance of the year: We eliminated the July 26th Chapter Board meeting and will hold it in conjunction with our July 11th lake outing.
- We encourage members to attend and support the NCMM Beaufort Boat Show on Saturday May 6th—with or without a boat.
- After hearing about liquor liability from ACBS insurer Doug Adams, we determined that from a risk management standpoint that it was not prudent for us to provide beer and wine at our boat show. We will invite attendees to BYOB.

We had to cancel the Trent River Run outing at the last minute due to predicted thunder storms. While the actual weather on Saturday April 22nd did not turn out as badly as predicted, what wasn't predicted was the 35,000 acre fire in the Croatan National Forest located between Havelock and New Bern. As of the 22nd, only 10% of it had been contained.




Cape Fear Community College Boat Show April 1st by John Dougherty

What are the ACBS Definitions of Antique or Classic Boat?

Historic: A boat built up to and including 1918 **Antique:** A boat built between 1919 and 1942

Antique: A boat built between 1919 and 1942, inclusive

Classic: A boat built between 1943 and 1975, (any material)

Late Classic: A boat built 1976 to 25 years prior to the current year.

Contemporary: Any wooden boat built within the last 25 years.

Boats classified as Historic up through Late Classic will be judged separately as Pre-

served or Restored boats. For more information click here.
